
Achilles Hides Among the Women

Achilles mother, the sea nymph Thetis, knew he was fated to die if he went to Troy. To try and spare her son that fate, she dressed him as a maiden and sent him to live amongst the women of the Court of Lycomedes. Odysseus was able to trick Achilles into revealing his identity by giving him a gift of a weapon.



Sacrifice of Iphigenia

After the army had gathered at Aulis, unfavorable winds kept them trapped there, unable to sail to Troy. The prophet Calcas decreed that the winds would only abate when Agamemnon sacrificed his daughter Iphigenia to the goddess Artemis. He agreed, his daughter was slain, and the Greeks sailed on to Troy.
